## Weekly Board Report 19 February 2016

The overall enrollment of Camp Verde Unified School District is 1528 as compared 1510 one year ago. Current enrollment vs. same time last year: Elementary 724 vs.748: Middle School 344 vs. 327; High School 426 vs. 409: Accommodations School 34 vs. 26. South Verde Magnet School 76 vs. 97.

Had a great meeting with NAU on Monday of this week. Three main ideas that I asked to the NAU President Dr. Cheng: Dual credit at our high school, Cohart for teachers in the Verde Valley to earn their master's degree, and adult education courses offered at our school or other Verde Valley schools. Dr. Cheng was very interested in progressing in talks regarding all three components. I have already been contacted and am progressing in discussions for a teacher cohart here at our school district. We have also been asked to potentially hold culinary classes here at our high school for adult students. The executive director from NAU has asked to meet with us to find a way to set this program up here at our district. Obviously more information will be occurring in the future.

A bill repealing the Joint Technical Education District (JTED) cuts set to begin in 2017 was signed into effect this week. What this means is drastic cuts to our Career and Technical Education (CTE) funding scheduled to go into effect will not happen. CTE funding for our programs should continue and there is hope funding may even increase. This is good news for our District as we can continue offering a variety of CTE programs for our students.

Camp Verde High School held the 8<sup>th</sup> grade orientation and 8<sup>th</sup> grade parent night on Wednesday, Feb. 17<sup>th</sup>. Over 160 students from American Heritage Academy, United Christian School, Beaver Creek, Camp Verde Middle School and student from Cottonwood IB school attended the event. The student council did an outstanding job organizing the opening assembly and guiding the students on the tour of CVHS campus and CTE courses. The CTE teachers gave exciting presentation and showed examples of what they may learn if they take their courses. The day ended with lunch provided by CVHS and an opportunity to visit with club and sports team members and sponsors. The parent night had over 110 in attendance. They were introduced to the CVHS staff and a performance by the CVHS choir. After the presentation they had time to visit with the CVHS teachers and view what sports and clubs CVHS offers.

Over the past three weeks Mr. Howe, Mrs. Zawel, Mr. Benson, Mr. Wall and Mr. Weir have researched and listened to several presentation on credit recovery software. The new software will replace the A+ credit recovery software at SVHS, CVHS and the Accommodation school. The three companies who gave presentation to the group were Compass Learning, Apex Learning and Fuel Ed. The group went through several courses to see the instruction and testing materials. After the review and presentations Fuel Ed was selected. The representative from Fuel Ed gave a follow up demonstration to Mr. Howe, Dr. Goodwin and Mr. Weir. The price for the online software is \$100 per student, and the plan will be to purchase 200 student licenses and a two day training for an estimated \$24,000. The rigor of the courses has been increased and the instructional videos for each lesson has been added to the Fuel Ed software. The possibility of blended learning for the teachers to use in the regular classroom is also included in the Fuel Ed software. The program can be used for different foreign languages, upper level academic courses, and the credit recovery courses.

The wrestling team finished in 5<sup>th</sup> place at the state Division IV Tournament. Matt Mejia won his second state championship at 132lbs. He went undefeated this season with a 34 – 0 record. He has received a wrestling and academic scholarship to Ft. Hays State in Hays, KS. Hayden Uhler won his 3<sup>rd</sup> state championship at 126lbs. Ez Casillas was state runner-up at 120lbs and Jesus Curiel was 5<sup>th</sup> place at

285lbs. Great job to the wrestlers and coaching staff. The girls' basketball team will play in the first round of the state tournament on Friday, Feb. 19<sup>th</sup> at 12:00 pm at Prescott Valley Event Center. The Robotics club will attend the first competition at Salt River HS this Saturday. Good luck to the girls' basketball team and the Robotics club.

National FFA Week is Feb. 22 – 26. Camp Verde FFA will be holding dress up days and lunch time activities each day during the week. On Thursday, Feb. 25<sup>th</sup> they will hold Ag Day at CVHS for over 800 students to tour and participate in Ag. related activities throughout the day at CVHS. This is put on by the Ag. Teachers (Ms. Taylor and Mrs. Mulcaire) and the Ag. Science students.

Digital Media Advanced students have designed a logo for Shea Padilla, AZ Department of Ed Program Specialist, in hopes that she will select it as her new logo for the Communication Media Technologies Dept.

All Digital Media students are competing in the MATFORCE anti-drug campaign. We are designing posters for this year's theme, "Stand By Me, Be Drug Free!" Grand prize earnings are \$250!!

Advanced students are also competing in the video contest for a \$300 prize!

We have completed the logo/design work for a local hotel. Their large interstate sign will be resurrected within a month. Students and Mr. Weir are communicating with a large pro sign company out of Phoenix to complete this project. Copper Canyon Inn (formerly Super 8) will be sporting our very own design work...a huge accomplishment, as this is a professional project.

Moscato, the newest restaurant in town has contacted us as well. The owner is interested in hiring our advanced students to design a website for them. We will meet with him next week to tour the venue and discuss his needs.

Yearbook hosted a fun marketing blitz for Valentine's Day last week. Photo backdrops were set up in the courtyard with tons of fun props. During lunch break, students dressed up and posed with friends for photos that will be featured on our "How Sweet It Is" spread. Cotton candy was an added bonus.


