INDIAN EDUCATION

Tribal officials and parents of Indian students shall have the opportunity to comment on the participation of Indian students pursuant to Policies ABA, AC, AD, BEDBA, and BEDH. Further, the District will schedule at least three (3) meetings each year for the specific purpose of receiving input either verbally or in writing from the Yavapai Apache Nation in order to better serve the needs of the Native American students The meetings will be held in one (1) of the schools, the central administration building, Yavapai-Apache Nation meeting room(s), or the Yavapai-Apache Tribal Council chambers. One meeting may include the annual joint meeting between the Governing Board of Camp Verde Unified School District (CVUSD) and Yavapai-Apache Nation Tribal Council. Yavapai-Apache Tribal Education Committee meetings may serve as an additional meeting to meet this requirement. Minutes will be taken and assessed in order to modify policies and procedures as appropriate, based on input received at these meetings, such that the students are better served. The District will respond in writing to address comments and recommendations made by the tribe or parents of the Indian children prior to the submission of the Indian Policies and Procedures by the district.

The District will also annually assess the extent to which Indian students participate on an equal basis in the District and will, if needed, modify its educational program to allow Indian students to participate on an equal basis. These assessments will be gathered by the Title VII Coordinator and include, but are not limited to, attendance, discipline referrals, co-curricular and extra-curricular activity participation reviews, and anecdotal information provided from teachers, students, parents, and community members.

The District will disseminate evaluations of educational programs assisted with funds provided under the act, including any program plans that the District intends to initiate or eliminate, to Tribal Council, District staff, and all relevant stakeholders. This will occur annually during the Yavapai-Apache Tribal Council/CVUSD joint board meeting.

The Title VII Coordinator will notify the Yavapai-Apache Tribal education committee, Council members, and parents of meeting locations, times, and dates during education meetings and via e-mail. Announcements of meetings will be posted at Council Chambers, the JOM office, and the Montessori school.

The District will annually review Policy IHBJ to ensure that it meets all minimum standards and continues to provide for an adequate level of Indian participation. If needed, the District will amend or modify policies and procedures to conform to appropriate requirements. The Yavapai Apache Tribal Council will be provided a copy of the Indian Policy and Procedures annually through tribal email.

Any amended policies or procedures shall be provided to the affected tribe(s) during the annual joint board meeting, quarterly Title VII meetings, tribal education committee meetings, and/or Yavapai-Apache Nation Tribal Council meetings.

(Participation of Indian parents and tribes in the educational process pursuant to special impact aid provisions for local educational agencies that claim entitlements based on the number of students residing on Indian lands)

The Governing Board shall give tribal officials and parents of Indian students the opportunity to comment on the participation of Indian students on an equal basis in the school program with all other students educated by the District. The meetings will be held in a public venue agreeable to the District and the Yavapai-Apache Nation. The District shall disseminate in a timely manner to tribal officials and parents of Indian students any evaluations of education programs assisted with funds provided under the Special Impact Aid Act, and any program plans for education programs that the District plans to initiate or eliminate. Parents of Indian children and tribal officials will have the opportunity to review materials and provide input and recommendations to the School District. This opportunity includes, but is not limited to, tribal education committee meetings, parent-teacher conferences, tribal council meetings, or School Board meetings.

The District will actively consult and regularly involve tribal officials and parents of Indian students in the planning and development of education programs assisted with funds provided under the Special Impact Aid Act and will afford tribal officials and parents of Indian students an opportunity to make recommendations concerning:

- ~ The needs of their children.
- ~ The ways by which they can assist their children in realizing the benefits to be derived from the education programs assisted with funds provided under the Special Impact Aid Act.
- ~ Their overall views on the education program in the District, including:
 - ~~ The operation of the District's education program.
 - ~~ The degree of parental participation allowed.

A. <u>Discussion/Presentation on Go Math Curriculum at Elementary School</u>
Elementary School Principal Britta Booth handed out information on the Math
Curriculum, covering a brief history on how the Common Core was established. Go Math
is a resource rich curriculum that ties into real world learning and problem solving; it was
specifically written to align with Common Core standards. The curriculum is very
promising, but like any new curriculum it is taking some time for the students and
teachers to fully grasp. The Elementary School is hosting a Fall Family Roundup on
October 20th, beginning at 5:00 pm, during which, there will be a Go Math demonstration;
family resources and homework help will be highlighted.
There was no action requested on the Item.

B. <u>Discussion/Update on South Verde Curriculums and Programs</u>

Principal Danny Howe gave an update on the South Verde High School programs, including Art on Fridays from 9 am to noon, and PE every day of the week. South Verde currently has 32 students enrolled. A few students participate in auto shop, band and culinary arts at Camp Verde High School. Mr. Howe and High School Principal Mr. Douvikas have been working together to find the best placement for students, given the options of the traditional High School campus, South Verde and the Accommodation program.

There was discussion on the Fuel Ed curriculum that was not what the administration had hoped it would be upon purchasing. Continuing with the program was not cost effective, nor faculty and student friendly, because it was not a complete curriculum. The company who owns both curriculum programs, A Plus and Fuel Ed, rectified the purchase by providing an updated version of the previously used A Plus software.

There was no action taken on the Item.

C. <u>Discussion/Report on Student Athlete Health and Safety and Compliance with Arizona</u> <u>Revised Statute 15-341.24 from High School Athletic Director Mark Showers</u>

Mr. Showers reported on student athlete concussion prevention, testing and protocol. He explained that all CVHS coaches, student athletes and officials are required to take and pass the AIA (Arizona Interscholastic Association) concussion education class. He spoke on the agreement that the school has with the Verde Valley Medical Center allowing the school to work with an outstanding physical therapist/athletic trainer. There was no action requested on the Item.

D. <u>Discussion and Possible Action on the Annual Financial Report (AFR) for Camp Verde Unified School District 2015-2016</u>

Director of Business Services Steve Hicks reported on the District's Finances from 2015-2016, citing the report as the budget in action. The document shows how the Distich's budget was spent. Mr. Hicks answered questions on the line items in the AFR. Motion: Mrs. Schneider moved, seconded by Mrs. McDowell, to approve the Annual Financial Report for Camp Verde Unified School District 2015-2016. The motion carried 4-0.

E. <u>Discussion and Possible Action on the Annual Financial Report for South Verde</u> <u>Technology Magnet School 2015-2016</u>

Mr. Hicks explained the South Verde Annual Financial Report stating that it should be the last AFR of the Charter School; the Charter conversion has been a long, and unclear process. The school had declining enrollment, decreased staff and a reeducation in revenue last year.

<u>Motion:</u> Mrs. Schneider moved, seconded by Mrs. McDowell to approve the Annual Financial Report for South Verde Technology Magnet School 2015-2016. The motion carried 4-0.

F. <u>Discussion and Possible Action to Accept As 1st Read Policy JLCD - Medicines/</u> <u>Administering Medicines</u>

Mrs. Freeman had questions on some of the language in the policy. Dr. Goodwin agreed to look back at the ASBA recommendation and then bring the policy back as First Read.

There was no action taken on the Item.

G. <u>Discussion And Possible Action to Enter into Intel Corporations, Experience Matters, Encore Fellowship Program for Technology Services from Retired Intel Corporation Employee Doug Reddell</u>

Superintendent Goodwin explained that Intel would pay a stipend to the District to pay for Mr. Reddell's assistance in technology. The plan is to have Mr. Reddell working on the active directory configuration for the District. There is a \$300.00 fee that the District will pay for services; Intel will pay the salary.

Mrs. Freeman asked that the Board receive the signed documentation and/or agreements, as information at a later date.

<u>Motion</u>: Mr. Roth moved, seconded by Mrs. Schneider, to enter into Intel Corporation's Experience Matters, Encore Fellowship Program for Technology Services. The motion carried 4-0.

H. <u>Discussion and Possible Action on Policy GCO-Evaluation of Professional Staff as First</u> Read

There was discussion on the language that was to be inserted into the policy describing improvement plans for teachers in the lowest performance classification and the procedures set in place for dismissal and nonrenewal of certified teachers. Mrs. Freeman suggested that the language that is in the regulation be inserted into the policy. There was no action taken on the item.

Dr. Goodwin explained that every district in the State goes through this audit about every 5 to 7 years. It is laborious and very detailed.
